AMC NH Chapter Chair Report, 2022

My dear friends and fellow AMC members,

First, I would like to take a minute to thank all the volunteers who, through the different activity committees and the executive committee, make the AMC as a whole, and, of particular interest to us, the AMC New Hampshire chapter such a great success. Those wonderful trails you walk on, that paddling trip you loved so much, that fun-filled weekend hiking hut-to-hut, that day of rock- or ice-climbing at the cliff with those awe-inspiring views, that cold and yet so idyllic winter adventure on skis in the New Hampshire backwoods... All of this exists because of the innumerable hours that our volunteers spend giving back to the outdoor and conservation community. So, when you come across an AMC volunteer, please take a minute to say thank you and acknowledge their efforts. And why not, you might even consider joining us and help us run the club! We are always looking for good folks!

Now, on to the business part! Last year, I had the privilege to step into the big shoes of my predecessor, Rick Silverberg, when I become the chair of the New Hampshire Chapter. It has been a very enlightening and humbling experience.

After two years of many restrictions due to the COVID-19 emergency, the AMC New Hampshire Chapter is coming out of this period in very healthy shape. We have managed to make the best of the situation by using video conferencing technology to run the club and to organize social events, such as the themeoriented evenings with paddling and skiing. Also, given the natural reduction in spending during the past two years, we have accrued a healthy surplus that we are now able to invest in improving our infrastructure for outdoor access.

The chapter donated \$19,500 toward the building of the All-Access Trail at Cardigan Lodge, a trail that lowers the barrier for folks keen to access the wonderful nature around the lodge. We are in the process of donating \$4,000 toward the building of a new kayak access ramp at AMC Knubble Bay Camp and Beal Island in Georgetown Maine. And, finally, the chapters donated \$2,500 toward improving the Wi-Fi connectivity at Cardigan Lodge.

The chapter held a spring picnic at Bear Brook State Park In Allenstown, NH, 35 people attended the event. The potluck-style lunch was combined with an option to go for a guided hike around the park or to do a guided flat-water paddle on the Suncook River.

Also, 2022 saw the gradual return of our Winter (2x) and Spring (1x) School events at Cardigan Lodge. Because of COVID-19 considerations, the schools were held as partially virtual, with preparatory and theoretical classes delivered virtually and an inperson day on the ground at Cardigan Lodge. This setup allowed participants and instructors to interact in person while avoiding the overnight stay at the lodge.

The chapter also returned to participate in the annual Discover Wild NH Day with a booth and with many volunteers from the chapter on-hand to answer questions. The day is informative and a great way to learn about AMC and the activities to Be Outdoors.

The chapter continued its commitment to train its active leaders by sponsoring Wilderness First Aid (WFA) training; this year, rather than booking one weekend of WFA at SOLO dedicated to just AMC chapter leaders, we took advantage of an AMC-corporate sponsored WFA training series offering more flexibility in choosing the dates for the volunteers as well as offering reduced costs. In the coming months, the chapter will evaluate whether we will continue with this option or return to the previous model.

We have several positions open in the executive committee (ExCom) and we would love to have your help: chapter vice-chair, membership committee chair, conservation and education chair, programs committee co-chair, and twenties and thirties committee chair. If interested, please reach out to anyone on ExCom or directly to me.

All of the AMC-NH committees have submitted a budget for 2023 as well as goals; these are summarized in the following pages. Here you will also find details about the many trips, workshops, and social events that are described in the individual committees' reports.

In closing, I would like to thank again all the volunteers and participants in our events; you are the people who make this chapter so successful.

Excursions Committee - Dan Heon & John Williams

The AMC-NH Excursions Committee (also known as the "Hiking Committee") had another productive year, despite lingering challenges with Covid. Here are some highlights:

Volunteer Hike Leaders

The backbone of our group is our cadre of about 90 highly trained volunteer hike leaders. Hike leaders had an opportunity to participate in a winter training session where we snowshoed into a forested area and practiced first aid skills, use of group emergency gear and fire building skills. We also had many of our leaders take the Wilderness First Aid (WFA) course offered by SOLO and upgrade their Map and Compass skills with workshops organized by Mike Motta and John Williams.

We would like to welcome the following new leaders into our committee: Bill Nesheim, Don Walters, Steve Zimmer and Selene Berube. We also have several leader candidates that are in the process of becoming leaders.

Day Hikes, Workshops and Outings

By far, our most important and best known outreach comes via our day hikes and outings. Even though our activities were still somewhat limited due to Covid, our leaders have led over 50day hikes, workshops and outings throughout the past year.

Winter Hiking Series

We continue to have a vibrant Winter Hiking Series (WHS), a workshop series which was started nearly 20 years ago. Larry Yetter serves as WHS Director and together with volunteer winter hike leaders, they help train over 25 hikers each year how to safely hike the higher peaks in winter. The series kicks off with a weekend workshop offering a series of lectures and hikes beginning in late fall and continuing into winter. Many of our Class 1 (Winter) hike leaders used this training to help prepare for the role of becoming a winter hike leader. This series was canceled in 2020, so it was nice to see it resume this past year and the course is full for this coming winter.

Over 55

Kathy Rockwood and LuAnn Laquerre chair our Over 55 Group. Through their efforts combined with other volunteers, we have grown our offerings to many events specifically aimed at our Over 55 members. In addition to several hikes, there was a large gathering for the last weekend in September at Cardigan Lodge where the group enjoyed hiking, great food and comradery.

Family Group

The Family Group of Excursions continues, although limited this year due to Covid. We are scheduled to have a large group at Cardigan Lodge in early November for a weekend of activities, hiking and good company. We thank Heather Layton for her leadership.

Winter and Spring School at Cardigan

A central part of our outreach and education comes from our annual weekend workshops offered three times a year at Cardigan Lodge, under the continued leadership of Workshop Director Rick Silverberg. During the winter sessions, we work in concert with the Ski and Mountaineering Committees and offer an array of skiing, snowshoeing, winter hiking and winter camping workshops. Prospective hike leader candidates are invited to take one of our leadership workshops during either of the three sessions.

Unfortunately, our Winter and Spring sessions in 2022 were limited due to a resurgence of Covid but are scheduled to resume fully in 2023.



After trending downward for about a decade, both club membership and our chapter's membership have started to rise again the last two years, a trend shared by all but two other chapters. The charts and graph below illustrate that membership has tended to rise and fall at a similar rate across all chapters over the last few years, with this year continuing the trend.



With COVID still a concern, the group hosted one Zoom social spotlighting 20s & 30s, before resuming in-person events once weather permitted in the spring. We were able to return to Discover Wild NH Day -- an event hosted by the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department -- which is the state's largest gathering of outdoor groups and enthusiasts. About a dozen volunteers from Excursions, Paddling, Trails, and the Executive Committee hosted a booth at the event that was attended by over 10,000 people. We also had a kickoff picnic at Bear Brook that drew over forty people and featured both a hike to Catamount Hill and paddle on the Suncook River.

Coming off a year that saw our chapter's membership and the number of volunteer-led activities increase gives us a great reason for optimism that we can continue to see growth as both a chapter and a club. With the return of in-person activities, the Membership Committee hopes to continue to provide opportunities for new and newly active members and to increase their participation in the club through spotlighting all that we have to offer.

2022 brought back the 12th Annual Knubble Bay Training weekend in Georgetown Maine at AMC Knubble Bay Camp Trip Leaders: Roscoe & Robin Diamond, Dana Gray (Boston/NH Leader) and LIT (Leader in Training) Caitlin Lemaire. We focused on self and assisted rescue practice group dynamics, navigation, equipment, leave no trace and more. Our paddles were short but filled with more learning to how conditions can change quickly on the water and that group dynamics leads to a safe paddle. Sunday, we packed up, cleaned up and headed back out on the water for a second paddle for the weekend.

AMC NH Programs Committee Report

Since the 2021 virtual Annual Meeting, co-chairs Susan Zielinski and Ashley Phelps have been working to bring interesting, informative speakers to AMC members via Zoom. In the past 12 months, the Committee has hosted five programs with a total of approximately 190 registered participants.

In November 2021, Doug Arion, Executive Director of the Mountains of Stars public science education and outreach program, gave a talk titled "Conservation on an Astronomical Scale." He discussed light pollution: its surprisingly widespread effects, its impacts on people and the environment, how it compromises our ability to observe space from the surface of the earth, and how we can fix the problem and save money at the same time. He also discussed light pollution reduction efforts in the AMC, including creating an International Dark Sky Park surrounding the AMC lands in the Maine Woods.

In January 2022, over 70 participants enjoyed Bruce Bolnick's talk on "The Changing Face of New England Forests." Bruce, a longtime AMC member and avid hiker, discussed the vast, beautiful forests of New England, and the White Mountains in particular. He looked at the evolution of the forests over the long course of post-glacial history, and the adaptations that continue today. He addressed important questions, such as: How did native Americans manage the forests? What did the forests look like when the first colonists arrived? How were the forests affected by population growth and economic development? What do climate models say about likely changes between now and the year 2100?

In February 2022, Becky Fullerton, Archivist for the AMC, gave a fascinating look at the AMC Archives. She helped us understand what is in the Appalachian Mountain Club Library & Archives, how things end up there, how it is all cared for, and how we can access the artifacts.

Larry Yetter, Adventure Travel and Excursions leader, provided an Introduction to Adventure Travel with AMC in a March, 2022 talk. He discussed how the Adventure Travel program works and presented a slide show of his four recent Adventure Travel trips to Switzerland, the Southwest US, and the Smoky Mountains.

In September, Programs Co-Chair Sue Zielinski offered an encore talk titled "More White Mountain Wandering," which was co-hosted by the Concord Library. She discussed her favorite hikes in the Whites and lessons she's learned from her miles in the woods, including planning, safety, gear, hidden gems, and hiking solo.



Finally, on October 22, 2022, the Programs Committee will host the NH Chapter's Annual Meeting at the Grappone Center in Concord. In addition to conducting chapter business and honoring 25- and 50-year members, we are excited to have Ben Kilham, a wildlife biologist, author, and the President of the Kilham Bear Center, delivering our keynote address: "The Social



Black Bear: What Bears Have Taught Me About Being Human." The Kilham Bear Center has been rehabilitating and releasing injured, orphaned, and abandoned black bear cubs since 1993.

AMC NH Ski Committee Report

For the 2021-22 winter season, the AMC New Hampshire Ski Committee offered a variety of backcountry and Nordic ski trips, 3 days of instructional clinics, and pre-season trail work activities for all public participants.

The COVID-19 pandemic had a slight impact on the ski season, most notably causing the cancelation of a week of backcountry skiing in Quebec (tentatively planned for March 2023). However, there was high demand for outdoor activities this season and most trips were well attended. Some trips were canceled due to poor snow conditions.

Trips

Ski Committee outings this past season included the following trips for all participants with appropriate skills. As dictated by weather and snow conditions, some of the day trips were re-located, rescheduled, or cancelled.



- 19 ski day trips (cross-country, light backcountry, and down-mountain backcountry) for a variety of skill levels in NH and VT.
- 1 weekend of down-mountain backcountry skiing in the Adirondack Mountains of NY.
- 3 days of pre-season trail work on the ski trails at Cardigan Mountain and at Pinkham Notch, NH.
- 2 days of ski-trail work in the White Mountains, in collaboration with Granite Backcountry Alliance.
- A weekly mid-week dawn patrol skin and ski at Whaleback Mountain in Enfield, NH.

Clinics and Workshops

Ski Committee leaders offered 3 days of instruction to backcountry winter travelers in 2022. In early February, we held

the fifth-annual "Ladies' (and anyone else) Resort to Backcountry" clinic at Mt Cardigan, NH. Our two annual Winter School weekends were held as day trips, due to COVID, with an online component prior.

Ski Trip Leaders & Training

At the close of the 2022 ski season, the Ski Committee had 32 ski leaders and 3 leaders-in-training (LiT): Al Grimstad, Daniella Reichstetter, and Jaimee Rondeau. One new trip leader completed their LiT requirements and became a full ski leader in 2022.

In addition to mentoring new ski leaders, the Ski Committee supports development and maintenance of active ski leaders' skills and knowledge in backcountry travel, skiing and instructional skills, and group leadership. After being on hold for two years, our annual Jim Tasse and Ted Stever early season tele and alpine clinics for leaders were held in December 2021 at Loon Mountain. Both days were well attended by leaders and LITs.

Several active ski leaders benefited from the following training that was funded by the NH-Chapter/Ski Committee:

- Wilderness First Aid training at SOLO.
- Eastern Snow and Avalanche
 Workshop (held virtually in October 2021)



<u>Outreach</u>

The Ski Committee draws interest by maintaining an Instagram account, @amcnhski, with weekly posts about skiing in New England. The account currently has about 1500 followers. Many

thanks to leader extraordinaire Dave Achey who started and runs the account.

Summary

The NH Chapter Ski Committee in 2022 continued its success in supporting a skilled pool of ski leaders and offering a wide variety of ski trips for all skill levels through a challenging ski season. We had a slow start to the season with poor snow



conditions, but a few mid-season storms righted the ship. Many AMC skiers had some fun days in the winter woods from January through March, making the best of our changing snow. The corn snow skied well in March and April. We look forward to even more fun in 2022-23!

AMC NH Trails Committee Report

This has been a year of greatly renewed activity! Our focus has been converting Cardigan's Nature Trail 2 (aka, the Upper Nature Trail) from its rustic, rundown condition to an all persons, all access state. Working alongside a paid crew of six, the Trails Committee co-chairs put in 400+ hours over 24 days and were assisted by 15 other volunteers. Adding together the NH Chapter's donation, the Robert M. Stillings Fund, and the matching dollars for volunteer hours, NH contributed over \$35,000. For a portfolio of construction progress check out https://photos.app.goo.gl/bBekXHyFs8jdmu3v8.

Trail completion is expected in 2023. Frank and Richie have taken on maintenance for the tool/work shed at Cardigan, along with the tool cache intended for trail adopters. The building and tools had been sorely neglected for years. Tools have been cleaned, sharpened, marked, and organized. We continue to work with other trail work organizations and adopters. That includes town and other local conservation commissions, the Society for Protection of NH Forests (Monadnock Trails Week), the NH Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, and AMC professional staff (chainsaw and ax certification, Trailwork College, Nature Trail 2 conversion).

Once again, we look forward to the annual co-operative effort with the NH and Boston Ski Committees on the Cardigan ski trails. With the advent of widespread COVID-19 vaccination we expect to cautiously reinstate the thank-you dinner after the workday. The Cardigan Lodge staff has churned again, with a new assistant manager and different seasonal staff. There are three projects of involvement/interest, conversion of Nature Trail 2 (per above), access to a skidder road off the 93Z Ski Trail, and installation of a new generator for the lodge. From individual trail adopters:

Al Grimstad (region leader for the Pinkham Notch ski trails and adopter of the Avalanche Brook Ski Trail): Four weekends scheduled.

Jamie Gillon (adopter of the Zeacliff Trail): His successful trip attracted eight participants and got a lot of brushing done.

Frank Miller (adopter of Cardigan's Back 80 from the Manning Trail to the cellar hole, and co-adopter of Nature Trail 2): The Back 80 is in better condition than any of the past 30 years, although there are still many drainage issues to resolve. Frank's guidance tearing down the old Nature Trail 2 bridges and constructing their replacements was invaluable.

Bill Foster (adopter of a section of the Kinsman Ridge Trail): Bill put in the hours transforming Nature Trail 2.

Richie Holstein (adopter of Cardigan's Back 80 from the cellar hole to the Elwell Trail junction, and co-adopter of Nature Trail 2): We relocated a particularly muddy stretch of the Back 80 by the 93Z junction. With the focus on Nature Trail 2 only minimal drainage and brushing has been done along much of the Back 80.

Clay Dingman and Sandra Heaney, co-adopters of two sections of the Elwell Trail, helped with additional brushing. Richie took on refurbishment of neighborhood trail work tools that had been left to rust, cleaning and sharpening them and resetting them on their handles.

The club needs to more widely and more respectfully recognize that volunteers are what keep it alive. Trail work is one thing, but we cannot neglect all trip leaders, naturalists, committee, and chapter chairs, ...
